Charlie Ration Cook Book No Food is to Good for the Man Upfront

About 20 years back, Shawn Carpenter and I were natural wonders and obscure historic sites. Both go with his two Navy Crosses. of us were teachers and we combind our wanderings with our annual participation in the National Rifle Matches at Camp Perry Ohio.

Shawn had done little traveling and it was a pleasure to, using an old phrase, "see the elephant" andobserve his wonder when he first glimpsed a glacier, the Hoover Dam or the goose necks of the San Juan.

Anyway, we had a invitation to visit Avery Island. Louisiana, the home of Tabasco Sauce. The invitation was tendered by the company historian. My brother had written a biography of Brig. company's records.



Upon arriving at the company plant on Avery Island, we were given a royal tour: the production facilities, his command car, the salt mine, his skeet field and a visit with the company chemist.. We

were also allowed to pay our respects at his placeof burial.



During the Vietnam unpleasantness, a number of appeals from troops led to the writing and publication for recipes which would make the C ration more palatable. The book, The *Charlie Ration Cookbook* subtitled *No Food is too Good for the Man Up Front* as printed with a camouflaged cover, and profusely illustrated with cartoon.



The pamphlets were wrapped around two ounce Tabasco bottles and shipped to the troops. Each addition contained around 20 recipes such as "Foxhole Dinner for Two", "Combat Burgoo" and "Cease Fire Casserole." The reader can access the full list at:


The Author's personal experiences eating decades old "Cs" purchased from military surplus stores has been distasteful. I recall a canned pound cake that had been reduced to a crumbly mass of flakes with no taste whatsover. The best I found were the malted milk tablets. The coffee met sub-minimal standards and the snipes in the engine room of a destroyer might drink it although the coffee they brewed using engine steam was dense enough to float an anchor. The most valuable acquisition from the C ration packets was a P-38 can opener (officially: Opener, Can, Hand, Folding, Type I) which I lost in the Andes Mountains a long time ago.



During the 1980s, Tabasco produced *Meals* Ready-to-Ex c i t e (MRE) shipped with a complementary two ounce of Tabasco.



Cartoonist Mort Walker illustrated the publication with Beetle Bailey characters. Many MREs used to come with a plastic bottle of Tabasco but now a packet has replaced the bottle.
